

Restoration of Church Nave floor

As reported earlier, the wooden floor in the Nave, particularly on the south side, is collapsing due to rotting of the supporting beams. The floor was constructed around 1860 during a major rebuilding project. There is no ventilation or damp prevention in the structure, so water has entered through the wall foundations and soaked upwards. Although the floorboards look quite good from above, they are extensively rotting underneath, and the beams are completely rotten along the south wall.

We have a time window between the last wedding on 3 September 2016 and Christmas to do the work, and our architect Toby Falconer is preparing a work plan and considering suitable contractors. This will be an expensive project and the PCC is considering how to raise the necessary funds.

Good and Bad Religion, by Peter Vardy

(Published by scm press in 2010)

This is a scholarly theological study from the Vice-Principal of Heythrop College, London University, which is a splendid contribution to clarifying the confusion and concerns which we are all experiencing in the rivalry between world faiths and the struggle with atheism and apathy. We have been given permission to serialise the 6 broad conclusions which he draws from the study in subsequent issues of the Forerunner. The Editor.

5. Any good religion must aim to foster human flourishing, to help human beings to develop their full potential, however this may be defined. Any religion that cannot show itself as fostering the fulfilment of potential of all human beings needs to be resisted. This means affirming that human beings must be genuinely free to make choices without being wholly determined - or at least that they have the capacity to come to this degree of freedom. Of course, genetics, evolution, culture, upbringing and the past may influence people in their decisions, but this is not the same as their being determined. Good religion should aim to help individuals use this freedom to foster and develop their full human potential. The more a religion helps individuals to develop their full potential and foster, for instance the virtues, the better it is likely to be. Arrogance, pride, self-assertion, greed, lust, avarice and the like cannot be part of good religion, and where these are encouraged religion needs to be resisted.

Why the Monarchy can Strengthen Religious Belief

An extract from an article by The Very Rev Dr Ian Bradley, principal of St Mary's College, St Andrews University, published in The Times on 7 May 2016.

From the time of her coronation, the Queen has taken her anointing and consecration very seriously and has expressed her understanding of the religious basis of monarchy and the exercise of its spiritual function in a sacrificial commitment to duty and public service, and a sure and steadfast Christian faith fortified and nourished through regular church.

The Queen has reached out to other faiths in her Christmas broadcasts, which have become more spiritual and personal over the years, commending not only the Bible, from which she has frequently quoted, but also the sacred texts of Islam, Judaism, Hinduism and Sikhism. She has increasingly come to assume the role of 'Defender of Faith', first proposed by Prince Charles in a television documentary in 1994 when he suggested that rather than just defending the Protestant Christian faith, the monarch should stand for faith in more general terms, expressing a sense of the divine and the spiritual dimension of life in an increasingly secular society.

The Queen's quiet assumption of this role has interesting implications for the future of the monarchy. Like other aspects of the institution, it is profoundly countercultural at a time when polls show that more and more of the British people are non-believers and indifferent to religion. It gives royalty greater significance for those who do have faith, notably Muslims, Hindus and Sikhs as well as committed Protestant and Catholic Christians. It is among these minorities that monarchy, with its sacred associations and symbols, will perhaps find its greatest supporters in the future.
