Churchyard working parties

Those who visit the churchyard will know that it is in poor shape at the moment after the trenching work on the footpath. We need to work on this as soon as we have some dry weather. We had intended to take the worst of the spoil away, but we are prevented legally from doing that as there are fragments of ancient human remains mixed into it.

The plan is to manually remove the rocks and stones which would wreck the mowers and which we can easily sort from any bones. This is tedious work, but our churchyard is one of the prettiest, and is the only public place in the village where one can enjoy distant views over the surrounding fields.

We would welcome any help from volunteers on this and will suggest times when we can commence the work.

Horses through the churchyard

In February we had a repeat of an event last year with two horses (probably the same ones) being ridden or taken through the churchyard.. This is illegal as the path is NOT a bridleway, and furthermore we have spent a lot of money renewing the path so that wedding parties can proceed to the west door on a clean dry surface.

If parishioners should observe this in the future, we would be grateful if they could make some mental notes so that we can investigate. Apart from perhaps pointing out that the path is not a bridleway, obviously any confrontation should be avoided.

Why Bother ?

There was a time when Christianity was part of the wallpaper of Western society. It was part of family life and its transitions; it was part of the round of the seasons and our response to nature; it was part of the art and poetry of the culture. Contemporary society doesn't have the same air to breathe; the Christian assumptions have gone. The question people ask in a consumer-driven culture is 'What's in it for me ?

Faith is important because it asks the question about meaning, and try as we may to do without it, that question keeps returning. Is life - and my life in particular - a meaningless accident, or is there some purpose to it that makes it worthwhile ?

Most people feel instinctively that their life must have a meaning, even if it doesn't keep them awake at night. The trouble is that we often only grasp the meaning of something when we get to the end. For example when I first met my future wife I had no idea of the meaning and significance of that meeting at the time. Otherwise I might have been more chivalrous !

But human beings are natural makers of meaning; we need to know what our lives add up to. Christianity suggests an answer: we have meaning - huge, astonishing and extraordinary meaning - as children of God, made in the image of God and made for his love - eternally.

Lasborough Park

Those of us who walk from time to time in the parish, and particularly in the Ozleworth valley, are familiar with the view of Lasborough Park House from the public footpath. This stunning building which is well hidden in the valley could not have a more beautiful location.

The historical background is recorded on Wikipedia as follows:

'Lasborough Park (or Lasborough House) is a Grade II listed country house in Newington/Bagpath Lasborough, Tetbury. The estate includes a medieval manor, a house and parkland. The original medieval manor, Lasborough Farm, dates to the 11th C, and included terraced gardens.

A manor house is recorded in the 14th C. The manor was surrounded by woodland and a deer park.

Lasborough House with its pleasure grounds was built in 1794 for Edmund Estcourt by James Wyatt in Tudor Gothic style. The house was enlarged and altered in the 19th C.'

The Editor

Shakespeare and the Elizabethan Theatre

When he first knew his exacting audience, they were eager for plot and pageant, noise and knock-about, gross clowning and bouts of courtly and learned wit, and music of the best, for the English had then the finest songs and music in Europe; and they were eager for the rhetoric of poetry as a vehicle for play and passion. All these things Marlowe and his fellow labourers had supplied, creating in a few years the new drama that Shakespeare found ready to his hand. He accepted the tradition, and in twenty more years expanded it into something far greater than the most consummate of public entertainments.

His poetry was of a yet higher strain than Marlowe's 'mighty line', and invented a prose dialogue as subtle, as powerful, and sometimes as lovely and harmonious as his verse. He made both forms the vehicles not only of beauty, terror, wit and high philosophy, but of a thing new in the drama, the presentation of individual characters, in place of the types and personified passions that had hitherto held the stage. Even the plot, even the action, became subordinate to the character, as in *Hamlet*, and yet the play pleased. So real were his men and women that we are forever discussing them as if they had a life of their own off the scene. It is to the Elizabethan theatre that we owe Shakespeare and all that he created. For that let praise be given to the theatre - and to the Elizabethans.
