Dear Friends,

'Remember, remember the 5th of November, gunpowder, treason and plot' so goes the well-known rhyme.

On the very night that the gunpowder plot was foiled, 1605, bonfires were lit to celebrate the safety of the King. Since then, November 5th has become known as Bonfire Night. The event is commemorated every year with fireworks and burning effigies of Guy Fawkes on a bonfire.

Some of the English have been known to wonder, in a tongue in cheek kind of way, whether they are celebrating Fawkes execution or honouring his attempt to do away with the government. I'm not sure which it is !

But I do know why we are remembering the following week on Remembrance Sunday.

Planning Applications

• Kingscote Barn, Binley Farm - Change of use from agricultural land use to Use Class C1 Hotels, and siting of 16 units of accommodation to include 6 eco lodges, 8 glamping pods and 2 shepherds' huts.

Planning approvals

- Walnut Farm, Bagpath (formerly Bumpers Island) Proposed alterations to outbuildings.
- Bagpath Court Barns Alteration and extensions of barn and attached stables (with approved ancillary residential unit) to create one independent dwelling.
- Kingscote House Reduce mature Lawson cypress by approx 5m, crown lift multi-stemmed Thuja over footpath to approx 3m clearance, reduce semimature cherry by approx 3m, reduce variegated maple by approx 1m.

Proposals for new Cotswolds parliamentary constituency

The independent Boundary Commission for England BCE has published revised proposals for new constituencies, including the Cotswolds. This marks the start of 8 weeks of public consultation, during which the Commission is inviting feedback to help shape the new boundaries. This is the last round of public consultations before the Commission makes its recommendations to Parliament.

During the consultation period, copies of the relevant documents for the Cotswold Constituency will be available for public inspection at the Council's offices in Trinity road Cirencester. The consultation closes on 11 December 2017 and comments can be made on the Commission's website at *www.bce2018.org.uk* where a map of the proposed boundaries can be studied.

Update your etiquette for the coming Party Season KISSING

In an article in the Country Life issue on 8 February 2017, Victoria Marston discussed when to kiss and how to kiss, without offending the target and without embarrassing yourself. The gender issue is carefully avoided, but readers will be able to make their own adjustments.

What started as the preserve of the French, artistic types and the luvvies among us has swept our nation and left us all in a state of confusion and awkwardness. First and foremost in the list of uncertainties is the basic dilemma of whether we should kiss the individual before us at all. Debrett's attempts to shed some light on the situation suggest:

'As a general rule don't kiss people you don't know. Don't kiss colleagues. Do kiss close friends and dates.' This decision is merely the first hurdle. Once committed to a kiss you should aim for the right cheek, but you should be prepared to change direction at the last minute.

Next on the list of uncertainties is whether one kiss suffices. Generally speaking you will probably be expected to kiss on the other cheek, but the British should not even consider a third or fourth.

Debrett's offers a final word of warning: 'If you'd prefer to shake hands, be sure to hold yours out before any kissing manoeuvres begin, but if you're part of a group introduction, don't be the only non-kisser at the party.'

If this is not helpful ignore it !

Communities of Grace

The well known writer A N Wilson announced his return to faith in a newspaper article at Easter 2009. He lost his faith in his thirties and began to rail against Christianity, writing a book on Jesus which made him out to be merely a failed messianic prophet. On his return he wrote:

Like most educated people in Britain and Northern Europe I have grown up in a culture that is overwhelmingly secular and anti-religious. The universities, broadcasters and media generally are not merely non-religious, they are positively anti. To my shame I believe that it was this that made me lose faith and heart in my youth. It felt so un-cool to be religious. With the mentality of a child in the playground, I felt at some visceral level that being religious was unsexy, like having spots or wearing specs ... For ten or fifteen of my middle years, I too was one of the mockers.

But as time passed I found myself going back to church, although at first only as a fellow traveller with the believers, not as one who shared the faith that Jesus had truly risen from the grave. Some time over the last five or six years I found that I had changed. When I took part in the Palm Sunday procession and heard the gospel being chanted, I assented to it with complete simplicity. My own return to faith has surprised no one more than myself.
