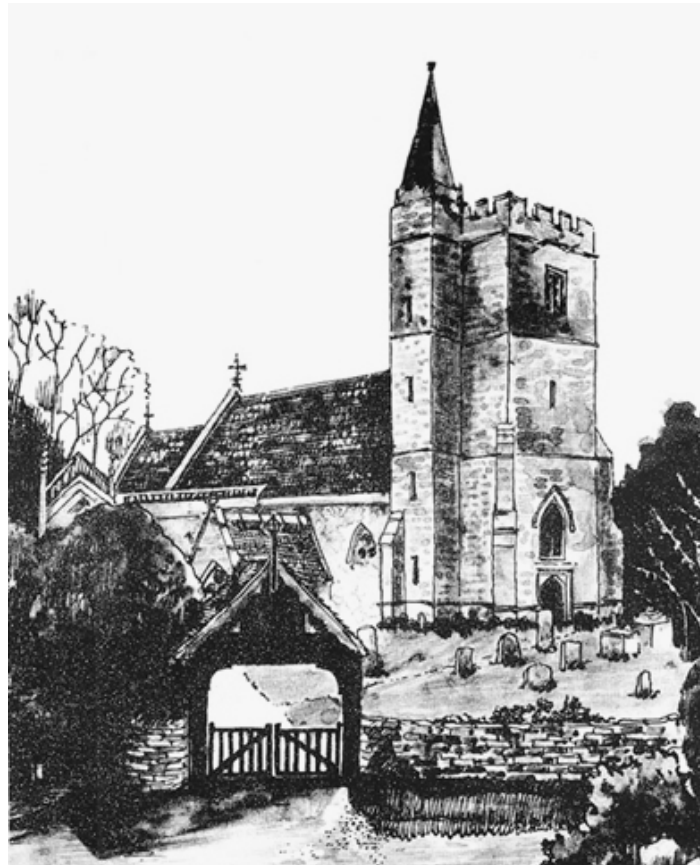

### **Process for the appointment of a new Vicar**

### **Half a million more for potholes**

Following a government announcement on 26 March, the GCC will receive an additional £512,339 as part of pothole and flood resilience funding. This is in addition to a £1,485,781 commitment paid in March 2018 and allocated in the GCC February budget.

The GCC already spends £3m to £4m each year on safety defects and about £3m each year on patching work to reduce the formation of potholes.

## **Elizabeth, Dorothy Margaret Trigg - in memoriam**

Elizabeth reminds us of the saying, "There is nothing as strong as true gentleness, and nothing as gentle as true strength".

Born in Shahjahanpur, India, in the last decades of the Raj. Judging from the old sepia photos, it seemed a very happy time ... Broad smiles on the faces of all the servants, as well of course her proud parents. Her father, Alexander Bayne retired from the Indian Civil Service in 1928 and the family moved to Colwyn Bay in North Wales.

After a very happy childhood, the clouds of war drew her to volunteer for the WRNS. She was the youngest commissioned officer in her service, and helped to maintain the engines of Corsairs and Seafires - where her immense pragmatism and ability to fix and mend things came into their own. Being the only woman in the Fleet Air Arm hangar, there was always a scrum to pick up her spanner whenever she dropped it !

After the war, she moved to London and met Harry - her Australian husband to be. It was to be a hugely happy marriage. They had three children - Michael, Bruce and Judi, and 5 grandchildren. Harry's ashes lie in Kingscote churchyard, and Elizabeth's will join him there shortly.

Apart from being mentally and physically strong, Elizabeth was hugely practical. She was an excellent upholsterer, and painted and decorated every family home in Berkshire, Sweden, Kent and finally Gloucestershire. Fiercely independent - yet always gracious, kind, selfless and generous to a fault.

She was forever young at heart and always curious. She was given an iPad for Christmas three years ago, and she loved and used it every day. Her daughter Judi also persuaded her into skinny jeans and a denim jacket in her nineties !

The Buddha said that in the end only three things matter - how much you loved, how gently you lived, and how gracefully you let go of things not meant for you. Elizabeth embodied all three.

### **Holier than thou: students most likely to attend church**

*Extracts from an article by Kaya Burgess in The Times on 28 March 2018. Data available for the first time shows that students at Oxford, Cambridge and Durham are twice as likely to worship on a Sunday as the general population, according to the Church of England. Whilst this is no doubt encouraging, both numbers are so low that euphoria would be out of place. However analysis of the likely causes is interesting.*

It is the first time that the church has published data for all three universities, finding that their chapels have Sunday attendances equating to 2.6% of the student bodies, which is almost double the 1.4% of the English population who attend Sunday services in Anglican churches. The real figure will be higher, as only 43 of the 56 chapels provided data.

University chapels are not part of the parish system and so are not included in the church's annual attendance figures. National figures show a steady decline due to ageing parishioners and a lack of young worshippers to replace them.

The Rev Dr Megan Daffern, chaplain at Jesus College, Oxford, said of students: "They are intrigued and curious. They are at a transitional stage and are asking lots of questions about life in general. We make it a really safe space to ask questions and don't ask people to leave their brain at the door."

The Dean of King's College, Cambridge, the Rev Dr Stephen Cherry, said: "Many young people in Cambridge are serious minded and are searching for deeper meanings and purposes in life, and are not so easily put off religion as the general population".

## **Churchwarden's Report to the APCM on 30 April 2018**

### **Milestones**

Without doubt the inspirational presence of our last incumbent Rev Mike Smith in the parish has been the highlight of the year. His dynamic ministry and endless energy have been an inspiration to all, and his departure was a severe shock. In retrospect, perhaps we can see that the parish did not deserve him.

Steady progress has been made in improving the building for public worship. New pew cushions in the nave and new areas of carpet in the chancel have added greatly to the comfort and appearance of the interior.

The plan for improved drainage around the north side of the nave and tower has been reconsidered in view of the difficulty experienced in handling the large quantities of spoil from previous trenching, and the difficulty of finding new soak-away locations amongst the many former burials.

### **The Church Ministry**

We have a very rewarding extended family group with 6 infant children who make our Family Services so enjoyable, but we have been unable to grow our active adult congregation which is now sustained by a small number of parishioners, together with visiting groups of non-resident wedding supporters. We are backed up by a large number of helpers from our community, without whom we could not operate the church, but we seem unable to attract them to Sunday services.

### **Future Plans**

Fabric improvements and restoration are proceeding actively, particularly in the rather neglected tower. We have lowered our two bells for reworking by Taylors of Loughborough, and they will be re-hung this summer. The floor of the Ringing Chamber in front of the West Window had to be partially dismantled to remove the bells, and this will be rebuilt after their return to incorporate a glazed balustrade required for safety. We did lay a foul water drain down the footpath from the West Door to the Lychgate during 2016, but although we know where we would build a WC Annex, there is no prospect of a drainage solution.

We will continue to seek ways of engaging with our community in the Christian Faith. We have a large pool of people who regularly attend our annual Christmas Carol Service, and our average attendance at normal Sunday services is 10. Our monthly parish magazine is distributed to every household in the parish, and we try to back up the vicar's letter with texts from books, publications and media news which we judge to be helpful. However our first priority is the appointment of a new Vicar.
