

Process for the appointment of a new Vicar

The churchwardens and representatives of the three parishes of Nailsworth, Horsley and Kingscote met with the Stroud Area Dean and the Deanery Lay Chairman on 9 May to start the process which will lead to a joint 'Statement of Needs' describing the abilities and attitudes sought in the new incumbent.

The next milestone is a meeting with the other parishes on 11 June to agree the joint 'Statement of Needs' and the membership of the interviewing panel. This will comprise 2 members from each of the 3 parishes together with senior diocesan Officials. Both will be discussed in draft by the Archdeacon and the Bishop of Gloucester.

The vacant post will then be advertised in the Church Times for two weeks in July. Interviews will take place on 19 September 2018.

In the meantime

Rev Stephen Jarvis who lives in Minchinhampton and is presently serving in the Bisley Benefice will join this Benefice on 4 June to assist Rev Sue Sobczak.

Just after Easter a group of church members from Nailsworth attended the annual interdenominational Christian Conference 'Spring Harvest'.

Every generation is catered for including the physically and mentally disabled. Mornings start with prayer and worship, followed this year by the study of the New Testament book of James, being as relevant today as it was 2000 years ago. In the afternoon seminars we discussed topical issues and heard from Christians in different walks of life.

However we were all struck by hearing the testimony of a North Korean Christian who had suffered imprisonment and torture because of her faith. She finally managed to escape to the south and now speaks about her life and the difficult conditions most North Koreans have to face every day. We too can find courage in the knowledge of God's love for us, that whatever we have to face, we can still be in a place of peace in our hearts.

Drilling holes into the Church Masonry



The C of E has an obligation to protect the listed buildings in its care and is particularly concerned to prevent the drilling of holes in masonry or woodwork. The availability of 'handymen' with electric drills is a particular threat, but many commercial contractors do not respect the existing structures.

The example on the left is at the outside door on the south side of the church which leads up to the Ringing Chamber and Gallery. These particular holes were probably drilled many years ago before Black and Decker, but illustrate the problem.

They were plugged with wooden dowels mostly containing the rusted remains of old hand made iron nails. They will be filled with a suitable mortar which will hopefully go some way towards recovering the appearance and integrity of the masonry.

The new brass mortice housing is not attached to the masonry at all but held by screws into the wooden strip against which the door closes.

Notes on Bagpath Church from the Online History Journal

The church stands forlorn, isolated, with tattered boarding, tumbled down gravestones and in danger of being consumed by the thickening trees, weeds and vines.

However for a short time from 1720 to 1731 the little church obviously became a trendy place to be married. Of the 21 marriages carried out in 1729 only 4 were for local parishioners. In April 1731 the charismatic Rector Lodge died and with him the happy ceremonies at the church on the hill.
