

Kingscote

In 19th century Kingscote, sport must have featured largely for many in the community, whether taking part in it or in a back-up capacity. In the early 1800s Robert Kingscote laid out a fine race-course in the grounds of his new Georgian-style mansion, which became known as the Goodwood of the West, and a secluded dell in the park was the scene of many prize-fights. Cricket, too, flourished for a time at Kingscote. Henry Kingscote was president of the Marylebone Cricket Club at the age of 25 in 1827. *Scores and Biographies* said this of him:

Mr Kingscote comes next, as fine a young man As ever was built upon nature's best plan; He stands six feet four - and, what often don't follow, His leg is a model to form an Apollo.

A fine slashing hitter as ever was found He sometimes has knocked the ball out of the ground; An excellent thrower, an hundred yards clear, And ladies protest that he runs like a deer.

There was the celebrated occasion at Lord's where in a two-day match in 1871 the MCC were beaten by over 250 runs by the Kingscote Club.

For a time towards the end of the century coursing flourished in Kingscote. And of

course with the hounds by then kennelled at Uley, fox hunting was always a popular sport whether mounted or as a follower on foot. The shoot supported a couple of gamekeepers, their dogs, and a pheasantry which was almost in the village.

The Burial Ground at St Bartholomew's Church, Bagath

Following the notification by a member of the public of pieces of bone having been exposed by the excavation of the access driveway in 2016, a considerable activity has resulted in clarification of the status of the burial ground. The diocese has confirmed that a part of the site (defined by the Land Registry) is still open for Christian burials and interments, for resident parishioners or those deemed to have a particular association with the parish.

This additional burial ground responsibility brings new administrative activity and no doubt expenditure concerning the safety of boundary walls and aged trees on site. As at Kingscote, all burials must be authorised by the vicar Rev.Sue Sokczak, and non-resident burials are subject to approval by the PCC.

The Diocesan Regulations covering churchyard burials and monuments are displayed in the porch at Kingscote Church. As we discovered when trenching at Kingscote, churchyards are heavily regulated by legal processes. The church building and the remainder of the site is of course privately owned.

We are very grateful for the dedicated work done by Alex Stephens, almost single handed over many years at Bagpath, to prevent it being overwhelmed by wild scrub.

The PCC

The Countryman Periodical

This very traditional publication was established in 1927 and has survived as a rather eccentric intellectual journal of rural gossip, information and provocation. Initially it was clearly aimed at landowners rather than land workers, but it has always had a hands-on approach.

The pioneer years

When the *The Countryman* was born in 1927, a year after the General Strike, the countryside was sliding rapidly into an agricultural depression. Conditions for country workers were not good but those who worked on the land and in the villages were finding a new voice: old class divisions were at last being broken and people had the courage to complain about low wages and often atrocious rural

housing. In addition, 'Rural' with a capital R, was coming into fashion: the middle classes were spreading into the countryside - as ramblers and cyclists, as motorists out for a Sunday drive, as commuters and as owners of weekend cottages - and many of them chatted over their dinner tables about the need for 'Rural Improvement'.

Major topics in the first decade of *The Countryman* ranged from flying to nudism, embracing along the way subjects such as vegetarians, electricity for villages, fox-hunting (generally against), improvements of rural cottages etc.

1930 The Country House Aeroplane

Countrywomen who fly - by The Hon. Lady Bailey, DBE

It is rather wonderful to think that, if you get a really grilling day in the summer, you can pull out your small aeroplane, start it up, take off and fly yourself down to the seaside for the day, or for the morning or merely for a bathe. Given a suitable field, with clear approaches and a small shed in which to house a light aeroplane, and there is the possibility of flying to any town in England or Europe or North Africa which possesses an aerodrome.

On a fine day some of the scenery up north, when seen from up above, is very beautiful. You can fly over the wild lake country in Cumberland and look down on the islands between the Scottish and Irish coasts.

No one, I feel can fully realise what the possession of an aeroplane means until he or she has tried it.

1932 The trend of Agricultural Thinking

The horse's Point of View, by a Farm Owner

My corn was tangled, and what is worse, grown in. Thank goodness I have a tractor. Cutting tangled corn with horses is a terrible business. People who talk about it being so sad that horses are being given up, they are so fond of horses, they are not interested in farming without horses, etc., simply don't know what they are talking about. If I were a horse there is certain work like ploughing which I should enjoy. When one is young and fit continuous steady work like rowing or cutting through trees with a crosscut saw, gives a sort of quiet joy which ploughing must give to a good pair of horses. But cutting tangled corn on a hot day with torturing flies, and the constant hacking and backing to get the binder out of tangles must be a torturing job. Any horse lover with imagination must see it. Mechanisation makes the farming world fit for horses to live in by giving a few of them pleasant healthy work and a decent life.
