

The Politics of Faith

An article published in The Times on 22 September 2018 by Frank Field MP who is a well known worker and campaigner for social justice in the UK. He was a member of the Conservative party, but left in protest at their tolerance of Apartheid in South Africa.

Writing about the link between my faith and my political activity is among the hardest challenges I have been given.. I can describe my political activity with ease. Exploring the link between my politics and my faith is where I face a quandary.

Put simply, I have never consciously thought of taking one course of action rather then another because I am a Christian. This may be because my Christian faith is too much founded on doubt to be the steady guide that it is to many Christians in politics.

I was brought up as a Christian at St Nicholas', an Anglican church in Chiswick, west London. It had a restrained Catholic worship, but a strong distaste of any excess of church millinery.

What St Nicholas' gave me was a more valuable gift in trying to see the world in sacramental terms. Here is this wonderful J L Pearson church, situated at one end of Chiswick Mall, the essence of the Christian story was captured in architecture.

Therefore I gained no rule book to apply to my politics. I was instead given a sense of a way of life that at its best, is an affair of the heart. I was given no rules or instructions on how to behave, but an idea about how to respond.

With this gift came a sense of providence. It didn't excuse me from making judgements about what were strategic goals and what were the best means of achieving these goals. In no sense was I to think that my life was on auto-drive. Activity is the cornerstone of being an active Christian and a responsible citizen. However, this gift of providence did give me a sense of being protected, and I've had that feeling for as long as I've thought about the purpose of life and its closure.

Linked to a sacramental view of the world has been a biblical basis for my utopian politics. The leitmotif running through the Old and into the New Testament is the concept of the Kingdom in this world. The historical Jesus heralds a Kingdom at hand, one that is being sought and built, and a Kingdom that is to be completed at the end of time.

Remembrance 2018 - The Centenary of the end of WW1

Few of us perhaps have had direct impact in their lives from WW1.

John Giddings' father served as a pilot in RFC in France, and they have photos and memorabilia from that time, including a propeller from his training plane. He returned to the family business in Dursley. He had two other bothers who served also, one of whom was killed on the Somme and the other who was in the RMC.

Harry Tubbs' father fought as a 19 yr old Artillery officer around Ypres in 1917 and 1918, and they have family and army photos from that time. He escaped without physical injury. He was undoubtedly psychologically scarred, but in those days there was little sympathy for that. He grew up in the countryside near Blockley, where his parents worked on the Springhill estate.

On Sunday afternoon 11 November at 3:00 pm there will be a memorial service at Gloucester Cathedral. Lutz Wagner and Harry Tubbs will represent this community. John is unfortunately engaged in a similar activity in Dursley at the same time.
