#### The Vicar's Letter

The snow at the beginning of February brought with it a picturesque landscape, and it reminded me that things never stay the same. The snow brought with it all sorts of difficulties, a certain amount of disruption, driving became hazardous, some people were isolated in their homes. But for some there was fun in this new landscape; for children off school, it turned lonely hills into slopes for sledding and for the artistic eye the picturesque snow scene.

There are other kinds of landscapes. People may refer to the political landscape, or the social landscape. We may all wonder what the landscape will look like as a result of politics and government decisions. Different landscapes shape and change our lives in different ways.

As we look ahead some of the landscapes will be exciting, new adventures, such as starting a new job or hobby, getting married, retirement. Some changes, however look like difficult terrain, times when there is sickness, loss and loneliness.

#### **Cotswold Brash at Kingscote**

Those of us who practice horticulture either for beauty or food production are well aware of the rocky nature of the ground in the parish, as are gravediggers and those trenching for services. If one is lucky one finds a spade's depth of stony soil (up to 50% stones) and clay followed by bedrock. To make it fertile, the options are screening the soil and removing the stones and/or importing better soil from elsewhere.

This situation does not seem to be well known amongst builders, architects, the Diocesan Advisory Committee, and many other bodies more familiar with working with the alluvial soils in the Severn Vale.

Once the layer of topsoil and clay has been removed, the bedrock which is generally comprehensively fractured, drains very well. One local borehole drainage contractor likened it to watering a horse; '*You just can't give it enough !* This is why our septic tanks work well as long as the surface pipes are clear.

#### Smartphones risk 'burn out' bishop warns

Extracts from an article by Kaya Burgess, Religious Affairs Correspondent, The Times, published on Saturday 9 February 2019

People should dedicate one day a week and a period of time every day when they ditch their mobile phones and log out of their social media accounts to create some 'alone' time, the Bishop of London has said. Speaking about the need to achieve a healthy work-life balance, the Right Rev Dame Sarah Mullally, said the stresses of life and being constantly 'connected' can leave people at risk of 'burn out'.

Speaking at a Church of England education conference on building character and resilience among young people, the bishop said: "We need to protect our time off and take short breaks. Times when we are not available to anybody, not on our mobiles and social media. Away time, alone".

At the same conference, the Rev Rose Hudson-Wilkin, the House of Commons chaplain defended the practice of reciting prayers at the start of business in parliament, after a group of MPs called for the 460-year-old tradition to be abolished.
