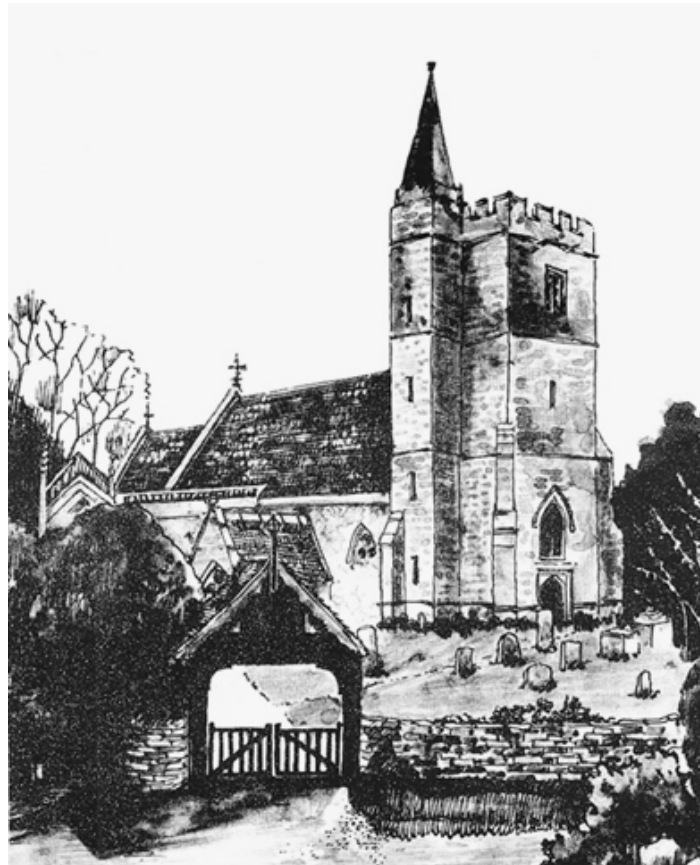

The Vicar's Letter

The school holidays are nearly here ! Year 6 children will be saying farewells to primary school and looking forward to moving to their new schools, the busy family holiday season is upon us and hopefully we will have some sunny days ahead.

Holidays are a time to break from the usual routine, time to relax and enjoy different experiences, from adventure holidays to lying in the sun. We all need times when we have a chance to unwind from the busyness of modern life.

The word 'holiday' is derived from an Old English word which originally referred only to special religious days, days of celebration to commemorate festivals and saints days; holy days.

In the Bible, in the book of Genesis, we read the story of God creating the world. After the sixth day when the work of creation had been done, God rested. God then blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because it was the day he rested from all the work of creating.

Met Office Sunshine Warning

The Met Office website for June 2019 contains warnings on the dangers to the human body from exposure to sunlight

- Surveys of UK public perceptions of the dangers and risks show that 41% of adults worry about UV being a cause of skin cancer, but only 22% worry about its effects on their eyes, despite UV being much more damaging to eyes than to skin.
- Many people underestimate the effects of UV, 25% thinking that it is only harmful when the sky is clear. Between 11am and 3 pm in the summer we should cover up and wear protection.
- Most people realise that UV is more damaging to children than to adults, about half of them thought that UV damage was reversible, which it is not.
- Eyes are 10 times more sensitive to UV than the skin. It can have both short and long term effects on the condition of the eyes. It can burn the surface, cornea and lens of the eye.
- Long-term exposure to UV significantly increases the risk of developing cataracts; a clouding of the lens and the leading cause of blindness in the world.
- Big pupils and clearer lenses mean that 70% more UV can reach the retina of a child.
- It is estimated that the lack of natural eye protection, combined with the amount of time children spend playing outdoors, could mean that as much as 80% of a lifetime's UV is absorbed into the eye by the age of 18.
- To protect the eyes from UV exposure it is important to wear good quality sunglasses.

Wearing sunglasses either over the eyes or the head in any weather can add an element of cool sophistication

Football Joy

Extracts from an article published in The Times on Saturday 1 June 2019

Jurgan Klopp, the Liverpool manager, has openly professed his Christian faith. Explaining the impact of his upbringing in a Lutheran home, he says: “There is nothing so important to me that I cannot bear to lose it, and that is why I find that I have no reason to fear. But the most important point is that this lust for life is actually connected to my faith. I am a Christian and so I see life as a gift that should be enjoyed sensibly.”

‘Gift’ has the same root as ‘grace’, the most central word in Christian vocabulary, while the other words that flow from it - such as trust, freedom, confidence, generosity and abundance are marks of Klopp’s approach to football. In the background lies Luther’s central affirmation that we are made right with God solely through receiving by faith His grace towards us in Jesus Christ, expressing the paradox of St Paul’s words: “Having nothing and possessing all things” (2 Corinthians 6, verse 10). The importance of our salvation does not obliterate the value of life in the world, but rather sets us free to live joyfully, creatively and responsibly.

The most seminal* Lutheran of the 20th century, the pastor / theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was executed by the Nazis in 1945, coined the distinction between the ‘ultimate’ salvation in Christ and the ‘penultimate’ of living under Christ in the world.

Klopp and Bonhoeffer drink from the same theological stream. Several journalists have noted Klopp’s ability to regain perspective quickly after intense involvement in a match - that is, to return rapidly to recognising its ‘penultimacy’. His comment on losing the Europa League final to Seville in 2016 was: “It’s not the most important thing in world, it just feels like it.”

One result is the ‘lust for life’ - he laughs more than any manager in the history of the Premier League. A further result is freedom from fear, and liberating teams to play confidently, joyously and positively. These are not religious words, but they resonate with a faith that helps people to cope with risk and uncertainty, and instils freedom and confidence to deal with injustices and challenges.

Such qualities come from many sources, but Klopp’s confirmation preparation at the Lutheran church in Glatten, in the Black Forest was likely a significant influence.
