

Come and join us

Most of us realise how fortunate we are to live in this beautiful place and in this harmonious community - there is no need for tempting fate by listing its many delights. Our beautiful, comfortable and well kept village church in Kingscote is one of them. Visitors from further afield are usually bowled over by the combination of architecture, history and peace which they experience when first seeing it. However it appears that few local people or visitors link their experience with the reason why the building is here. It is a shame to wait until we are lying comfortably in our coffins before giving the matter some thought.

Communities of grace

In his book 'God lost and Found' John Prichard, a well known Anglican theologian and clergyman, wrote: Communities are a vital part of our social ecology. They are where we gain our identity, preserve our traditions and establish friendships. They bridge the gap between family and society. They are large enough to extend our sympathies but small enough to be intelligible. They are the human face of the common good, which would otherwise remain an abstraction. They are where we learn to be citizens, carrying our share of the collective weight.

Pre-eminent among such communities in most localities are churches, those communities of grace which seek to be the human expression of divine love - fail as they must with such a high aspiration. I often meet people who have found a real home in their local church, often making chance contact with it through a baptism or funeral, or the friendly presence of the vicar.

The local church is a community of people in relationship with each other, knowing that they have been blessed by God and now seek to be a blessing to others. They should provide:

Welcome - The smile of God comes on a human face. This should be a place which will welcome me and be interested in who I am and what I bring.

Sanctuary - This should be a place of nurture where I will be loved and valued.

Simplicity - In this over-complex world where I may have lost my spiritual way, I may be looking for simple rhythms, cherishing the heart in the ways of the Spirit, offering home to a friend, and being a hub that equips us all for discipleship through the week.

The specific ‘Textbook’ purposes of the church are:

- To proclaim the good news of the Kingdom of God.
- To teach, baptise and nurture new believers.
- To respond to human need by loving service.
- To seek to transform the unjust structures of society.
- To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.
