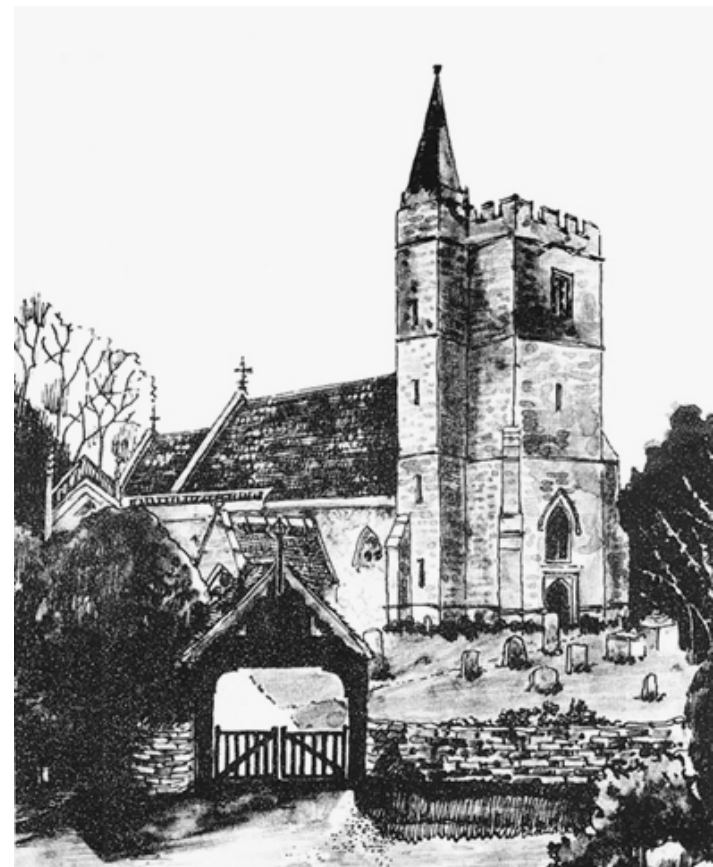

Visit by the Bishop of Gloucester

On Sunday morning 29 September we will be joined by The Right Revd Rachel Treweek, Bishop of Gloucester, and all parishioners are invited to come along.

It is difficult for senior clergy to fit in visits to the many tiny churches like ours, but Graham Nichols invited her some time ago to re-consecrate our restored bells. The last such visit was by Bishop Michael who blessed the metal cross above the Lychgate, made for us by Martin Pride.

This means that it is still a public place for which we have Health and Safety responsibilities, such as ensuring that the boundary trees are safe. We have had a recent quotation for £1,900 for tree work.

At our next PCC meeting we will be considering ways to try to reverse this deficit situation. If you have any suggestions please talk to any PCC member so we can discuss it. If we want to keep our church open for business when we need it we need to be able to fund it, and we know from the Bagpath situation what the alternative is.

The demise of the Manor House

*Based on the book 'The manor Houses of England'
by P H Ditchfield - possibly reflects the fate of Kingscote Manor*

England is remarkable for the number and beauty of the old country houses, set amid pleasant scenes, that abound in various parts of our island. Hidden away from the gaze of the multitude in sequestered villages and obscure hamlets, they are very humble minded, very retiring

At the end of the 19th century there was a veritable rage for pulling down old mansions. (No doubt the Kingscotes had already been under pressure from their association with Queen Victoria and Albert, the great moderniser) Reckless owners who love new things, new fashions and new styles, have doomed many of them to death.

Perhaps the only relics we have from the house are the chancel rail engraved with 1615 and the wall panel in the north transept marked with 1639. There are also important monuments in the Graveyard section for the Kingscote family.

Keeping our Church Running

Visitors are always complimentary about our beautiful church and the fact that it is open during the day. This is thanks, in no small part, to all the volunteers who keep the grass mown, the brass and silver clean, flowers in the Church and not least, opening and locking the church each day.

The PCC is very grateful to all involved and appreciate the value that it gives to alleviate the everyday costs. However, over the last couple of years the running costs, which as a fully functioning parish church we cannot totally control, have exceeded our income, and as with all enterprises, this cannot go on without an unhappy ending. Last year the running cost (eg electricity and heating oil, insurance, Parish Share paid to the Diocese, but not building repair costs) of the church was £16,077 and the income just £14,113. This year the prediction is for an even greater deficit. This is due to several different reasons:

- People's pattern of attending church has changed over the years due to life-style changes, and there is not a regular commitment to attending the Sunday service. This has resulted in a much lower amount contributed from collections.
- Regular contributions paid into the church bank account through planned giving have decreased due to people moving from the area or, sadly, passing on.
- We have had fewer weddings and lower collections. Each wedding contributes £257-00 in fees to our funds, but the collections from the congregations have been less, perhaps because people don't carry cash these days.

New costs are arising with the maintenance of Bagpath Churchyard. For many years we all understood that this was closed, but we have recently been informed that this is not the case and that the burial ground is still open for new interments.

The Vicar's Letter

This was followed by a series of appointments in the Diocese of London as well as a woman 'participant observer' of the House of Bishops. In March 2015 it was announced that she would become Bishop of Gloucester, and on 19 September 2015 she was installed as the 41st Bishop of Gloucester.

Progress with Church Fabric restoration and improvement

1. Installation of a safety balustrade in the first floor tower ringing chamber to prevent potentially fatal falls through the gap between the floor and the west window is our major current project. This will comprise brass rails and reinforced glass panels to allow as much light as possible from the west window into the church.
2. In association with this we need to provide a partition in front of the steep staircase leading down to the churchyard.

Our proposal to use a vertical drainage borehole to solve the problem of rainwater gathering on the north side of the nave appears to be vetoed permanently by the DAC. Instead of a 6 ft deep 6 inch diameter borehole, they prefer yards of surface trenching crossing numerous graves leading to a large excavation for a new soak-away. We did just that a few years ago and ended up with tons of Cotswold brash stones and bones which are very difficult to dispose of. It seems that the borehole is not sufficiently medieval.
