

As the leaves change colour, prepare for winter, it reminds me that there is some predictability in our climate, and this is how God intended the seasons to be.

It has been a good year for arable farmers, and now we come to the season when we celebrate harvest. At St John the Baptist, as in other churches, we will give thanks to God, sing harvest songs and share in harvest refreshments. All are welcome!

Friends reunited

Copied from the book 'God lost and found' by John Pritchard

Faith is not a fluffy feeling that changes with the health of our bank account and the state of our digestion. Faith is an attitude to life and as such it is something that we can choose or not. We will want to choose it on the best available evidence, of course, but ultimately no one can ever be forced to believe and surrender to God. There are no knock down proofs, no guaranteed highs, no spiritual silver bullet. Whether we are coming to faith for the first time or trying to find a lost path, we come to a point where we have to choose. Shall I suspend my disbelief and leap into space?

People of faith believe that spiritual reality is, at the same time, both hidden and revealed in the physical world; there is a complete interpenetration of the two, which is why the sacramental view of life is so perceptive and accurate, talking of 'outward and visible signs of inward and spiritual grace'. Do we want to live within a closed secular world-view or an open spiritual one? The choice is ours.

Here is another version of the Choice. Do we see religion as one ideology competing with others for our acceptance and adoption, or as a way of seeing the world and everything in it? Many of us would maintain that true religion is not one of a thousand things but *the way we see* a thousand things. Faith is a process before it has content, and that process is about how we see.

Faith is not a thing in itself, although it has a huge treasure store for us to investigate later on. Rather, faith like a window in a house which we value not so much for the thickness or quality of the glass as for what we can see through it. Our task –our choice– therefore is to keep the glass clean. A Christian is a window cleaner.

Through the glass of faith we see everything as it truly is, sparkling in the sunlight or drenched in torrential rain. Faith does not have a sentimental, rosy view of reality; it is absolutely realistic, but it also sees everything as shot through with the presence of God, who is always active in sustaining or redeeming every bit of life.

Our choice, then, is whether to subscribe to that way of looking at life or not. If we can dissociate faith from being one ideology among many, and understand it rather as a way of seeing all of life and every ideology, then the choice is clear. Is this the glass, the lens, through which we want to look - 'or do we look for another?'
