

The Vicar's Letter,

Last weekend we celebrated Candlemas, when the Christian Church celebrated the presentation of Jesus in the Temple. This festival brought to an end the Advent/ Christmas/ Epiphany cycle and we now look towards Lent and Holy Week.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday which this year falls on 26 February. There will be a service at St George's when our foreheads will be marked with ashes, a reminder of this penitential season.

Lent is a time for spiritual growth and spending time with God. The tradition during Lent is to give something up; this very often seems to be chocolate, cakes or sweets, but sometimes something different like watching television. The idea of giving something up for Lent comes from the Christian tradition of Lent being a time of fasting as we remember Jesus fasting in the wilderness for 40 days, as well as part of our preparation for Easter.

Maybe you will give something up this Lent, but it seems more common these days in the Lenten journey to take something up rather than give something up. Do something extra such as, setting aside some extra time for prayer or visiting someone you may think is lonely, reading a Lenten journey book, or coming along to the Lent House Group.

Lent is a time to re-evaluate our lives and our contributions to the world in which we live, a time of focussing on our relationship with God. I wonder what you will do this Lent.

Get Ready for your new Recycling Service

- * From 20 March 2020 CDC will be making substantial changes to the kerbside recycling process which will require residents to segregate the recycling waste into more categories.
- * Refuse and recycling collections will remain fortnightly.
- * Food waste must be kept separate and put into a new outdoor food waste bin which will be emptied each week.
- * Garden waste collections will switch to fortnightly and <u>must not contain</u> food waste.
- * A new larger bag will be provided for cardboard.
- * You will need 2 black recycling boxes one for paper and the other for glass.
- * It is intended to allow recycling of other items including textiles, shoes, cartons, small electricals, and household batteries. Further clarification will be provided in an information pack which will be delivered during February.
- Some collection days may change, which will be clarified in the information pack.

It's not implausible that we move to fascism

One thing that could go right would be a continuation of the improvement in the conditions of the poor that has happened over the past 30 years. That should now spread to Africa. Also Europe and the US need to wake up from this political nightmare and go back to a more civilised conversation about the biggest things they have to grapple with - climate change and equality.

What could go wrong is that politicians refuse to pay attention to what economists are saying. What has happened in the UK and in America could easily spread to France, Germany, Sweden, Italy, Spain. The Russians are willing to undermine anything that can be undermined. It's not an implausible outcome that we move much closer to full-grown fascism.

As for poverty, what could go wrong is that growth in India and China slows down and they decide to fix it by slashing social support. That would stop the improvement in the lives of the poor that we have seen over the past 30years. The poor live in such fragile conditions, it doesn't take very much to go from living OK to a complete disaster.

How do we move from a culture of 'I' to one of 'We'?

Over the next decade, liberal democracy will be tested as never before. Technological change of unprecedented pace and power is transforming everything from politics to personal relationships, while institutions are lagging far behind.

We have nation states, but our most serious problems - inequality, international corporations, climate change, mass migration, data manipulation and surveillance - are global. Governments are weak in the face of these forces, and few visionary states-people have emerged.

Europe was destabilised for two centuries after the invention of printing, and today's innovations are yet more disruptive. Expect a volatile decade.

One of the biggest challenges now facing democratic freedom is moral. We live in the most individualistic age of all time. How do we move beyond the self towards a renewed commitment to collective responsibility and the common good? How do we shift from a culture of 'I' to one of 'we'? How do we renew our moral bonds, strengthen civil society, restore morals to markets, accept responsibility for the future of the planet and re-establish the social contract between the government and people?

A free society is a moral achievement. Forget that and we will lose our liberty. In the next decade the future of freedom will be at stake.
