
VICAR'S LETTER

It is the time of year when we think about harvest, when we give thanks to God for the crops of the field; an abundance of fruit and grain that will sustain in the coming months. It is also a time to give thanks to farmers and all who work on the land and gather the crops, those basic ingredients for food production. Of course, a good harvest is dependent on the weather. Last year we saw evidence, due to weather changes that the fruits of harvest are changing. Spring planted crops such as malting barley and milling oats did not make the grade for food production, due to extremely wet weather through the winter, and then virtually no rain when it was planted in the spring.

So far this year, weather changes are very evident. The world has seen extremes of weather, flooding, and heat waves; we see the signs of climate change. They are signs that make us think about the world we live in, and they are signs that we need to act to look after the world that God created and gave us to be our home. We read in Genesis, the first chapter of the Bible, about God creating our awe-inspiring beautiful world, teeming with life and full of diversity and abundance and colour. The mobile Post Office will be at Kingscote Village Hall every Monday and Thursday from 9am to 10am.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

At time of publishing the following current planning applications were on the Cotswold District Council (CDC) website and were applicable to the parish of Kingscote with deadline dates for consultation responses during September.

Hazelcote Farm - Compliance with roofing materials, bat survey, nesting sites and lighting design strategy conditions of permission 19/03925/FUL - Conversion of 2 no. attached barns and an attached stable block into 2 no. dwelling houses as holiday accommodation. Application received 22 July 2021 and validated on 16th August but not consultation date provided.

The Maltings, Windmill Lane, Kingscote -Variation of design and windows conditions re permission 16/01627/FUL - Erection of first floor side and front extension. Standard consultation expiry date - Tuesday 14th September 2021. Note- Only applications classed by CDC as 'current' and with relevant consultation expiry dates are included in The Forerunner each month. The standard consultation expiry date seems to be 21 days after validation of the application by CDC although there are exceptions and sometimes applications do not seem to be listed on the website immediately after validation. Applications may not feature in the Forerunner if both the validation date and the expiry date fall in between Forerunner publications.

If you are keen to keep abreast of all new planning applications it is recommended that you check the CDC website regularly and/or register to receive email alerts direct from CDC.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

1. Appointment of new Parish Clerk

We are very pleased to welcome our new Parish Clerk, Elizabeth Oakley, who will be taking on this role from September 1st.

2. Installation of broadband services in the parish

The Gigaclear network in Kingscote is live and multiple households are already connected. Completion of the installation in the rest of the parish is supposed to occur this autumn, but we have no news yet about the programme. Meanwhile, Openreach is progressing installation of overhead fibre broadband in specific parts of the village and this system is expected to be live by November.

KINGSCOTE CHURCH - BUST OF LORD RAGLAN

Thank you to Harry Tubbs for sending in information about one of the busts in the church in Kingscote. A bit of extra research tells us more about Lord Raglan (Baron Raglan of Monmouthshire from 1852)

The bust on the left-hand side of the window in the Lady Chapel is of Lord Fitzroy Somerset Raglan who had been the right-hand man and military secretary to the Duke of Wellington during and after the French Wars. Lord Raglan married Wellington's niece and Wellington described Raglan as 'a man who wouldn't tell a lie to save his life'

Raglan was chosen to command British troops in the Crimean War- the mid 19th Century war between the alliance of British. French. Ottoman and Sardinian troops and the Russian Empire, for control of the Ottoman Empire. Lord Raglan was criticised for the order for the Charge of the Light Brigade - an order compounded by poor communications, whereby over 600 British men charged for 1.25 miles, facing Russian troops from three different All the world wonder'd: directions. The blunders and trauma were described by Alfred Lord Tennyson in his poem-The Charge of the Light Brigade:

Half a league, half a league, Half a league onward. All in the valley of Death Rode the six hundred. "Forward, the Light Brigade! Charge for the guns!" he said: Into the valley of Death Rode the six hundred.

"Forward, the Light Brigade!" Was there a man dismay'd? Not tho' the soldier knew Some one had blunder'd: Theirs not to make reply. Theirs not to reason why, Theirs but to do and die: Into the valley of Death Rode the six hundred.

Cannon to right of them, Cannon to left of them. Cannon in front of them Volley'd and thunder'd; Storm'd at with shot and shell. Boldly they rode and well. Into the jaws of Death, Into the mouth of Hell Rode the six hundred.

Flash'd all their sabres bare. Flash'd as they turn'd in air Sabring the gunners there, Charging an army, while Plunged in the battery-smoke Right thro' the line they broke; Cossack and Russian Reel'd from the sabre-stroke Shatter'd and sunder'd. Then they rode back, but not Not the six hundred.

Cannon to right of them. Cannon to left of them. Cannon behind them Volley'd and thunder'd: Storm'd at with shot and shell. While horse and hero fell. They that had fought so well Came thro' the jaws of Death. Back from the mouth of Hell. All that was left of them. Left of six hundred.

When can their glory fade? O the wild charge they made! All the world wonder'd. Honor the charge they made! Honor the Light Brigade. Noble six hundred!

Lord Raglan was born (1788) in Badminton, the youngest son of the 5th Duke of Beaufort. He died in Sevastopol (Crimean peninsula), in 1855, of dysentery and is buried in Badminton.

It was during the Crimean War that Florence Nightingale revolutionised nursing practices and sanitary conditions at military hospitals in the Crimea, having been asked by the British Government to organise a corps of nurses to tend to the sick and fallen soldiers there.
