All about Candlemas

Candlemas or the presentation of Christ in the Temple is celebrated on the second of February each year and can be celebrated on the Sunday nearest to the date. It commemorates the time, described in Luke 2, when Mary and Joseph brought the baby Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem to give thanks for his birth as the first-born son and to make an offering to God. Their offering was two turtle doves or two young pigeons, traditionally the offering of the poor, confirming that Jesus was born into humble circumstances on earth.

Candlemas occurs forty days after Christmas and in Medieval times the Christmas decorations could be left up until Candlemas. Candles were also brought into church on that day to be blessed for use in the following year. Snowdrops may have been brought into church to decorate the church for Candlemas as well as lots of candles. Some old churchyards have lots of snowdrops growing in them, perhaps to help celebrate Candlemas.

Today Candlemas is seen as a climax to the Christmas Epiphany season. It formed a scene in a Nativity tableau held in the chapel of a London hospital in the 1970s. The staff playing Mary and Joseph would walk in carrying a new baby, born in the hospital, they would be met by two of the older sisters who were playing Simeon and Anna. Simeon would take the baby, hold him up and give him a little squeeze so he would move a bit, and those watching would realise it was a real baby and not a doll. There would be a collective gasp of realisation.

Simeon and Anna were two older people who worshipped God devoutly and were guided by the Holy Spirit. They recognised Jesus, and Simeon spoke to Mary and Joseph about Jesus in words, known as the Nunc Dimittis which have been used in Evening prayer since the Reformation. He spoke of Jesus as bringing salvation to all people, a light for revelation to the nations and to bring glory to Israel. Understandably Mary and Joseph were amazed at what was said. Mary was warned by Simeon that a sword would pierce her heart, and 33 years later as she watched her son being crucified she is likely to have remembered Simeon's words. Anna too recognised Jesus and began to praise God and speak about him to everyone who was looking for a redeemer. Candlemas is a turning point in the Church year, a last celebration of the birth of Jesus as the light of the world, and a looking forward to his death and resurrection as the Saviour of the world at Faster

As we move into February we come on the twenty-second to Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent. As the days grow longer, hopefully the weather warms up and the flowers start to come out, we move into a period of reflection and penitence as we prepare for the fulfilling of Simeon's prophecy to Mary on Good Friday before the celebration of Easter.

As we are in a fairly dark time of year in early February, with short days, challenging news and times, the reminder that Jesus is the light of the world is very welcome. Jesus came to bring God's love to us all and to bring his light into the dark places in the world that we might dwell in light rather than darkness. As the days lengthen let us seek to live in the light of Jesus and to share that light with those who are in a dark place.

- 1. The next meeting of Kingscote Parish Council will be held on Tuesday 21 February 2023 at 7.30pm in the village hall. The agenda will be published on our website and the notice boards. Anyone from the parish is welcome to attend.
- 2. As you will be aware, the weather this winter has led to many new potholes developing on the roads in Gloucestershire. We have been liaising with GCC Highways about the problems in Kingscote parish, and although three serious potholes in the village have just been repaired, we will need to keep pressing for more action elsewhere in the parish.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

At time of publishing the newsletter, there was one prior notice of an application - for a new potato storage building at Home Farm - but no consultation dates were provided on the system.

Note- Only applications classed by CDC as 'current' and with relevant consultation expiry dates are included in The Forerunner each month. The standard consultation expiry date seems to be around 21 days after validation of the application by CDC although there are exceptions and sometimes applications do not seem to be listed on the website immediately after validation. Applications may not feature in the Forerunner if both the validation date and the expiry date fall in between Forerunner publications.

If you are keen to keep abreast of all new planning applications it is recommended that you check the CDC website regularly and/or register to receive email alerts direct from CDC.

Domestic alternative fuel payment

The government has announced that the domestic alternative fuel payment is available for homes not using mains gas for heating. The one-off £200 grant payment will come to households via their electricity supplier at some point during February. This payment is in addition to the Energy Bills Support Scheme grant of £400 which households should already be receiving (payable monthly £66 / £67 per month between October 2022 and March 2023).
