## KINGSCOTE PARISH COUNCIL

### 1. Accidents on the A4135 near Hunters Hall

There have been two similar accidents recently where cars waiting to turn right off the A4135 into Kingscote village have been hit in the rear and pushed into the path of oncoming traffic. Head-on collisions were narrowly avoided – fortunately – but both incidents were frightening experiences for the drivers and both cars were seriously damaged.

We are also aware that vehicles turning right when leaving the village or when exiting the road from Bagpath or Hunters Hall car park there is restricted visibility.

We will be raising our concerns about the safety of these locations with GCC Highways.

# 2. Revision of the Cotswold District Council Local Plan

The Government now requires Cotswold District Council (CDC) to plan for 1036 new dwellings per year or a total of 18,650 new homes during the 18 years between now and 2043. Since this is roughly double the previous target. CDC has to prepare a new Local Plan. This will qo through two stages of consultation before it is sent Government approval at the end of 2026.

CDC has written twice to the Housing Ministers (Angela Rayner and now Steve Reed) to argue that the target for new homes is excessive, especially since 84% of Cotswold District is Cotswold National Landscape (AONB) where major developments are not permitted.

The November report from our district councillor. Tony Slater, gives some additional detail, along with a map of the proposed areas for new homes. # 2. Revision of the Cotswold District Council Local Plan (cont)

the public consultation drop-in session in the Winstone Room at the Corinium Museum, Cirencester on Thursday 18th December between 2pm and 7pm.

#### 3. Local Government Reorganisation

On a similar timescale to the production of a new Local Plan for Cotswold District, there will be a major reorganization of local government in Gloucestershire which is intended to eliminate the six District Councils and have one, or perhaps two, unitary council(s) covering the whole county.

# 3. Local Government Reorganisation (cont)

There are three alternative proposals, and Government will decide in mid 2026 which to accept.

New Neighbourhood Partnerships will be established to provide a link between the unitary authority and Town/Parish Councils.

On the night before Christmas, a child in a house,
As the whole family slept, behaved just like a mouse . . .

The child at the window stared up at the sky,

Where two aeroplanes sped to the east and the west, Like a pulled Christmas cracker. The child held her breath And looked for a sign up above, as the moon Shone down like a gold chocolate coin on the town.

#### **Classic Christmas Pudding**

#### Serves 6

#### Ingredients:

- 125g dried mixed fruit
- 150g currants
- 150g raisins
- 150g sultanas
- 20g stem ginger in syrup, drained and finely chopped
- 1 orange, zest and juice
- 1 lime, zest and juice
- 5 tbsp calvados or brandy
- 115g butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
- 115g dark muscavado sugar
- 2 tsp ground mixed spice
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp ground ginger
- 115g self-raising flour
- 100g fresh breadcrumbs
- 2 British Blacktail Medium Free Range Eggs, beaten
- 2 tbsp milk.

#### Classic Christmas Pudding (cont)

#### Method:

- 1. Mix together all the dried fruit, stem ginger, citrus zests and juice, and the Calvados or brandy in a large bowl. Cover and leave overnight.
- 2. Grease a 1.2 litre pudding basin with butter and place a small circle of baking parchment in the base. Beat the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy, then mix in the spices, flour and breadcrumbs. Add the eggs and milk, then the fruit mixture and any soaking liquid.
- 3. Spoon the mixture into the basin to 1cm below the rim. Cover with a double layer of greased baking parchment followed by a large piece of foil. Tie loosely around the rim with string so that there is room for the pudding to expand. Put the basin in a steamer, or a saucepan with an up-turned heatproof saucer on the base. Add boiling water to come two-thirds of the way up the sides of the basin. Cover the pan with a tight-fitting lid and simmer for 4 hours. Keep the water bubbling throughout and top up with extra boiling water as necessary.
- 4. Remove from the pan, cool, then wrap in fresh baking parchment and foil. Store for up to 3 months in a cool, dry place or in the refrigerator. When needed, reheat by steaming the pudding in the same way as above, for about 2 hours, until piping hot.


